Theme of the Summit



In a moment of deep ecological crisis, this year's EcoFaith Summit calls us to become part of the Holy Spirit's subversive plot to pollinate an alternative way of being human for the sake of life.

In this plot, we find our model and hope from pollinator species. These tiny, apparently powerless, often overlooked and disregarded creatures, whose drastic decline endangers so much we depend upon, are a key to the regeneration of life itself.

As participants in this great plot, faith communities of every size and place can be demonstration plots, pollinating alternative ways of living. We all steward plots of land, even tiny ones, which can become pollinator habitat.

In this critical and decisive time, a 'Kairos' moment, what we do with our specific plots wherever we are, matters. How we live the Gospel paradox that God's power is shown in weakness can engage us in active hope amid the growing crisis we face.

Through worship, keynote presentation, diverse storytellers, conversations, and engagement sessions, together we will be empowered to be participants in this unfolding plot.

- ① To engage our congregations and communities in supporting pollinator habitat.



All congregations and communities are called into the Spirit's grassroots movement to heal, restore, and renew God's beloved earth creation in this decisive, Kairos time. As we are learning, this movement arises from the paradoxical power of the Gospel. Through listening, storytelling, music and the arts, the sharing of voices and concern, we empower one other to demonstrate an alternative way of being human for the sake of life.

The EcoFaith Network of the NE MN Synod, led by a leadership team of 20-some people, nurtures this movement in diverse ways, including the annual EcoFaith Summit, which we began in 2016 and now are co-presenting with the St. Paul Area Synod Care of Creation Work Group and the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, the Green Blades Rising Newsletter, begun in 2020 and now co-sponsored with the Saint Paul Area Synod Care of Creation, seasonal Creation Care Connections events offering practical ideas and mutual support in integrating creation care into congregational identity, the new ecofaithnetwork.org website (also in partnership with St. Paul Area Synod Care of Creation), an emerging synodwide pollinator project just piloted last summer (see separate report), micro-grants and micro-grant accompaniment to help fund new earth stewardship initiatives, annual leadership retreats, begun in 2011 and now including our companions from other regional synods, the Green Blades Preaching Roundtable, weekly reflections on the ecological implications of the lectionary from a variety of preaching writers, periodic synod resolutions to heighten our synod's clarity and commitment to creation care and eco-justice; and collaborative partnerships, especially with other nearby synods, in which cross-pollination of relationships and actions is taking place.

The EcoFaith Network is mostly funded by contributions from individuals and from congregations who choose to become **EcoFaith Network Partner Congregations**, and also by partner support for specific events, such as the EcoFaith Summit.

We are a group which explores life-giving ideas: where best practices within our synod and the larger church and community can be shared, where action and advocacy are encouraged, and where we become part of the public and teaching voice of the Church.

Our Continual Focus — We strive to be an inspiration and creation care resource for the 110 congregations in the St Paul Area Synod. Through online communications to our list-serve, Tool Kit presentations, phone calls, personal contacts, church inservice and *Green Blades Rising Newsletter* subscriptions (https://www.ecofaithnetwork.org/subscribe), we strive to keep our congregations up to date on God's call to care for creation and the many ways this is possible. In keeping with the ELCA Social Message on Government and Civic Engagement, we encourage our members and congregations to continue to advocate for environmental justice and protection.

Our Recent Emphasis -- For the past several years, our workgroup has been particularly enthused by the positive climate impact of regenerative agriculture. We have expanded our knowledge base through participation in webinars, podcast listening, guest speakers and most important, direct conversation and onsite visits with farmers. We shared some of what we have learned at the 2022 EcoFaith Summit.

Our workgroup supports the ELCA Social Statement: "The ELCA holds to the biblical idea that God calls God's people to be active citizens and to ensure that everyone benefits from the good of government (Jeremiah 29:7, Romans 13:1-7).28. Our members advocate for legislation that supports socially just creation care and encourages our congregations to do likewise.

Pollinator Friendly Alliance is a grassroots non-profit conservation organization and stands as a Minnesota leader in pollinator conservation. Volunteer-driven and based in the St. Croix River Valley, we:

- Expand habitat and biodiversity.
- Reduce pesticide pollution.

- Advocate for pollinator protections.
- Share knowledge.

PFA is unique in its ability to unite with community, partner with public and private entities, and gather and excite volunteers to create pollinator habitat. To date, PFA has restored over 200 acres to natural protected habitats in Minnesota. PFA has a history of engaging the public in immersive field studies on pollinator conservation through citizen science programs. PFA is an educational leader with their annual "Best Practices for Pollinators" summit. This inspiring three-day summit brings together scientists, educators, public and private presenters and practitioners, and local to federal agencies to inspire best practices for ecologically sound tactics and a healthy environment. "Best Practices for Pollinators" has grown into an internationally streamed event and since 2016, over 3,000 people have attended. PFA advocates for pollinator protections in local communities and statewide. This year PFA is leading two initiatives; 1) to protect public state–managed lands from pesticide contamination so state parks, state forests and wildlife management areas can be the wildlife sanctuaries they are meant to be, AND 2) create a statewide roadside wildflower habitat program along Minnesota state highways to support birds and pollinators called HIGHWAYS for HABITAT.

Current Organizing Campaigns

Rural Electric Co-ops

To put it simply, it matters where our energy comes from. Is the energy source sustainable? Does it exacerbate climate change and cause harm to ourselves and our neighbors? Who has access to

renewable options, and who is currently left out? Electric Co-ops are a unique avenue for people to directly engage in shaping a community's energy choices. As people of faith, we are called to engage these cooperatively run utilities, challenging board members and other leaders to greater and more equitable investment in renewable energy. Specifically, EcoFaith is engaging Minnesota Valley Electric Cooperative (MVEC) in the south metro area of the synod.

Inclusive Financing

The high cost of home energy efficiency improvements is one of the inequities built into our energy system. This is why we have been advocating to bring Inclusive Financing to Minnesota. Inclusive Financing is a program designed to allow anyone living in an inefficient home including renters, undocumented folks, and those with no access to capital, to make energy saving changes.

Our Inclusive Financing organizing has brought us to the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission, Minneapolis City Hall, and into congregations where we continue to hear the need to make climate solutions more accessible.

WHO WE ARE

Lutheran Advocacy-MN (LA-MN) and its citizen advocates work for justice in the areas of hunger, poverty, and care of God's creation. LA-MN is a ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and the six Minnesota ELCA Synods. We seek to live into the ELCA vision to "Step forward as a public church that witnesses boldly to God's love for all that God has created."

WHY WE DO IT

To advocate is to plead the cause of those suffering injustice. Advocacy ministry is rooted in Scripture, Lutheran theology, and our baptismal calling to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. It is expressed by advocating with and for our neighbors in need, for the sake of the common good, in places where important decisions are being made.



HOW WE DO IT

We work with and through synods, congregations, campus ministries, church members, and others to create and use networks for advocacy. Lutheran citizen advocates write personal emails or letters, make calls, and meet with their state legislators (or members of Congress) to impact decisions. Lutheran Advocacy-MN is non-partisan, and participates in coalitions to enhance advocacy effectiveness and build political will to address important issues in God's world.

HOW YOU CAN GET INVOLVED - OUR INVITATION TO YOU!

- 1) Join our Email & Action Network: Email tammy@lutheranadvocacymn.org with a) your name, b) your email address, & c) your address (so we know your legislative district); OR go to www.lutheranadvocacymn.org to sign up online.
- 2) Take Action Now by Contacting Your State Legislators with the following message:

State Senator: Please work to ensure that the Next Generation Climate Act (SF 2188) is included in the Senate Energy & Climate Omnibus bill.

State House Representative: Work to ensure that the Next Generation Climate Act remains in the House Energy & Climate Omnibus bill, and that it stays in the final bill through negotiations with the Senate.

Talking Points: a) The Next Generation Climate Act will update our state's greenhouse gas emissions targets to align with the best current climate science; b) Recent data shows that Minnesota's electricity sector is cutting emissions, but other parts of the economy are showing increases in carbon, methane, and other harmful pollution; c) God calls us to take care of the earth, not destroy it; d) (Say something about yourself—Who you are, Your congregation or where you are from, Why you care about decreasing harmful emissions).

- 3) Pray for Your Legislators & Legislative Decisions: Pray for wise decisions, decreasing polarization, good relationships with their colleague legislators, & stamina for long days through these last 5 weeks of session.
- **4) Donate to Lutheran Advocacy-MN:** Send a check to our office or donate on our website so that we can have Hunger Advocacy Fellows or paid interns every year, rather than every few years.

Today the sites, now owned by more than 80 congregations, offer time and space where kids can explore faith in the outdoors and where all people are welcomed as a neighbor.

Camp Hiawatha and Camp Vermilion are situated on some of the best lakeshore in the country. VLM seeks to educate ourselves and our community in an effort to sustain these lands. We are called to be caretakers of Creation and know that we are part of the continued work by the Anishinaabe people, the families who invited others to the camps in the early days, and the churches that support them now. VLM is actively researching both the celebrated and the tortured history of these lands and peoples with hopes of better understanding our shared history and in an effort to move forward together.

Plotting for Pollinators: Responding to Creation's Cry for Justice

My passion for insects began as a child, and the more I learned, the greater the fascination. My parents encouraged this in allowing me to collect various animals, keep them in jars and cages, nourish, and watch them grow.

I decided to follow my heart and earned an Masters of Science in Entomology from the University of Minnesota. My graduate work involved studying the aquatic insects that are bioindicators of water quality, which meant working many hours in streams and rivers, often on property owned by organic farm families. I consider myself most fortunate to have developed lifelong friendships with these true stewards of our environment.

Fifteen years ago, I began taking classes in beekeeping. That challenge led to studying native plants and the insects with which they evolved. Soon I began focusing on native bees and other terrestrial pollinators, and their roles in sustaining ecological integrity.

I devoted my garden to native perennials and the pollinators that soon arrived. Far too many insects are not well understood for their absolutely critical roles in sustaining life on his planet, and the photographs I've taken from my yard in St Paul and No MN reveal the truly wondrous diversity of life all around us.

My fascination with insects remains strong and their adaptations and resiliency continue to amaze me. However, the challenges to environmental sustainability caused by our decisions as humans has created serious losses in honeybee colonies as well as declines in many native insect, plant, and bird populations. Now more than ever, we absolutely must work to protect and conserve all that we possibly can of this amazing gift with which we have been entrusted, Creation.

NE MN Synod EcoFaith Network 2022 Pollinator Pilot Project Becoming a Pollinator Synod

In the escalating ecological and climate crisis, we often feel powerless, even as we grieve for what is and can be lost. God, however, does not call us to resignation. For the people of Christ, this is not despair time. It is Kairos time, and God is waking us up for faithful action together.

Last spring, 2022, the EcoFaith Network's leadership team asked these questions: What is something that every congregation in our synod could do, no matter the size of our membership, our budget, or the land where our church is located? Something which may seem insignificant on our own, but together can powerfully serve the regeneration of life?

Our imaginations turned to pollinators. These tiny, apparently powerless, often overlooked and disregarded creatures, whose drastic decline endangers so much upon which we depend, are a key to the regeneration of life itself. We all steward plots of land, even as small as pots of dirt, which are or can become pollinator habitat and Monarch Way Stations ~ not only our church grounds, but also our homes and our neighborhoods.

We dreamed. What if congregations all over Northeastern Minnesota advocated and planted and advocated for pollinators? Together, we could make a difference! Our churches could be models for their neighborhoods! We would be experimental demonstration plots for God's holy desire to heal and restore the web of creation!

The EcoFaith leadership team decided to embark on a Pollinator Piot Project. Over the summer of 2022, a steering committee mentored six congregations over the summer of 2022 in their first year of planting for pollinators. Four other congregations were inspired to start as well. Together with congregations who have already been gardening for pollinators and Monarchs, there are now 19 pollinator congregations in our synod!

The national network, *Lutherans Restoring Creation*, also got wind of what we are doing, and asked us to be the presenters at a monthly Creation Connections Call. Many of these congregations are participating in the EcoFaith Summit, *The Pollinator Plot: Cross+Pollination in a Time of Ecological Crisis*.

This year we are inviting all congregations to become part of a synodwide pollinator project. We will provide support from the pollinator project steering committee, the mutual encouragement of other congregations, and through our new EcoFaith website, ecofaithnetwork.org.

The Northeastern Minnesota Synod's EcoFaith Network is also bringing a resolution to the synod in assembly to become a Pollinator Synod, "embracing a vision for regional regeneration of pollinator habitat", and "walking together as the synod to live into our call as pollinators of the gospel in our witness to God's love in Jesus Christ for all creation, sharing practices across our synod and beyond". We would be the first Pollinator Synod in the ELCA, but maybe not the last.

In this critical and decisive time, a Kairos moment, what we do with our specific plots, wherever we are, matters. How we live as demonstration plots of the Gospel paradox that God's power is shown in weakness matters too. We are pollinators, offering active hope, in our communities, our synod, and in the upper Midwest.

Monarchs must have milkweed since it is the only plant upon which the female will lay eggs, and it is the only plant the caterpillars (larva) will eat. There are several types of milkweed that grow in our region: common milkweed, swamp milkweed (doesn't need a swamp), butterfly weed, showy milkweed, whorled milkweed, and poke milkweed.

The Green Blades Preaching Roundtable gathers multiple voices to reflect on the ecological echoes, intersections, and urgencies in preaching the weekly lectionary in this time of existential, ecological crisis.

The writers range from entering seminary students and first call pastors to retired pastors. They include ordained pastors and deacons, seminary professors, spiritual directors and creation advocacy leaders.

Some writers focus on one reading, usually the gospel. Others address each of the four readings. Some include liturgical and hymn suggestions. All of them listen for the living Word, in love with the whole creation, pleading, singing, beckoning, reckoning.

Within each Sunday lectionary lies the grain of God's living word spoken into this Kairos, crisis time of intersecting environmental, racial, and economic challenges. As we mutually attune ourselves to hear these ecological echoes and intersections, the Wordseed germinates, pollinating the Spirit's grassroots movement to tend and mend our relationships as part of the interdependent web of creation.

Congregational Care-for-Creation Covenant

As a congregation committed to care for creation, we **affirm** God's creation in all its glory and beauty. We **acknowledge** God as the source of all things. We acknowledge Christ as the redeemer of all things. We acknowledge the Spirit as the sustainer of all things. As a result, we strive to respect all of life as sacred. We **accept** our vocation as Earth-keepers who care for creation. We accept our responsibility to live justly in relation to our fellow human beings in ways that all creatures may mutually thrive together.

Worship: We seek to worship throughout the year so that we express our gratitude and praise to God as creator, redeemer, and sustainer. We are committed to glorify God intentionally together with all creation. In worship, we will celebrate creation, confess our sins against creation, grieve the losses of creation, and commit ourselves to care for Earth.

Education: We seek to learn about the biblical, theological, and ecclesial traditions concerning creation, including the biblical mandate from God for us to care for Earth. We also seek to learn about the present degradations of creation due to human activity, how these degradations are related to human exploitation and oppression, how we as religious people are implicated in these matters, and what we as Christians can do to heal and restore creation for future generations.

Building and Grounds: We agree to assess the impact that our activities and the use and maintenance of our property may have upon creation—in such matters as energy and water use, cleaning products, lawn care, paper use, food choices, recycling and waste, and transportation. We will strive to make choices that lessen our negative impact on Earth and that serve to renew and restore Earth community.

Discipleship as Home and Work: We encourage ourselves as individual members of this congregation—at whatever age, economic level, ethnic group, or walk of life—to care for creation in our personal lifestyle, in our homes, and at our work—knowing that our habits and practices can contribute significantly to care for creation. We seek to foster a closer relationship with nature so that we can live simply and walk lightly upon Earth.

Public Ministry: We seek to change the systems that foster the degradation of creation and to rectify the injustices that result from it. And we seek to alert our members to environmental legislation that protects creation and to encourage their active participation in the development of public policy. We encourage members to engage in civic activities that foster ecological health.

Because we desire to leave Earth a better place for our children, we will promote love and respect for creation among our youth, teach them responsible Earth practices, and engage them in projects that restore creation. We will pursue this mission in a grace-filled manner, seeking to find hope and joy in the commitments and sacrifices these provisions may entail and in the restorations they engender. We seek to let our care for creation be known to others.

Pollinator Synod (from Synod EcoFaith Network)

WHEREAS, "the earth is the LORD'S and all that is in it" (Psalm 24:1) and God sends forth the Spirit to "renew the face of the ground" (Psalm 104:30); and

WHEREAS, the work of pollinators is essential to the integrity of the biosphere, the ecological wellbeing of all life across the world, particularly the sustainability of food production; and

WHEREAS, populations of pollinator species have been decreasing and are being threatened by climate change, diminishing habitat, and the use of pesticides and other chemicals; and

WHEREAS, the EcoFaith Network of the Northeastern MN Synod at the 2022 assembly launched a Pollinator Pilot Project in which six congregations were given seed kits to install pollinator friendly gardens on their church grounds with the purpose of inspiring more congregations in our synod to do the same; and

WHEREAS, the EcoFaith Network of the Northeastern MN Synod has nurtured relationships with and among these pollinator pilot project congregations and at least thirteen others through its ongoing virtual connection meetings in which ideas and support are shared for growing in creation care ministries and establishing pollinator gardens and Monarch Waystations; and

WHEREAS, the EcoFaith Network of the Northeastern MN Synod has this year planned and hosted an EcoFaith Summit, "The Pollinator Plot: Cross+Pollination in a Time of Ecological Crisis," co-presented by three synod creation care groups across state lines (Northeastern MN Synod, Northwest Synod of WI, and St. Paul Area Synod) in which pollinator species – tiny, apparently powerless, often overlooked and disregarded creatures – were lifted up as a model and hope of the gospel paradox, of God's regenerative power hidden in weakness; and

WHEREAS, the EcoFaith Network of the Northeastern MN Synod has cultivated "cross pollination" of creation care ministry ideas among and beyond our synod congregations through the website, Facebook page, annual EcoFaith summits, monthly e-newsletter Green Blades Rising, preaching roundtable, relationship building, and resource sharing; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Northeastern MN Synod declare itself a Pollinator Synod, that is, a synod embracing a vision for regional regeneration of pollinator habitat, in which, with the guidance and equipping of the earth-renewing Spirit, all its congregations and expressions:

- promote pollinator friendly habitats on their church grounds, at home, and in the neighborhood,
- work to eliminate the use of pesticides and other pollinator-harming chemicals on church grounds and encourage their members to do the same,
- consider themselves "demonstration plots" for earth-honoring experimentation in worship, education, congregational life, building and grounds, and community action; and be it further




